hen TfL stopped producing bus maps back in the 90s, (the now-retired) Mike
Harris plugged the gap by drawing up versions in his own time.
Having joined in 1973 as a trainee schedule compiler in the buses department, he was perfectly qualified for the job.

Mike's maps – popular with enthusiasts and travellers alike – were originally sold for £I, with surplus (after-production) costs donated to charity. The maps have since raised more than £26,000 for worthy causes.

HONOURING THOSE WE LOST

memorial – on Braham Street, EI – was unveiled by Mayor of London Sadiq Khan and TfL Commissioner Andy Lord. It pays tribute to London's transport workers who tragically lost their lives to coronavirus.

The memorial consists of a plinth-mounted plaque alongside a flowering foxglove tree. Two railroad benches enclose the space, allowing quiet

reflection and remembrance, so we may never forget their sacrifice.

The memorial was unveiled during a ceremony for the families and friends of those we lost. London's Transport Choir sang, and Andy gave an opening speech. The Mayor also spoke before inviting attendees to join him in laying tributes.

FONDLY REMEMBERED



Reginald Bunning, 96, passed away on 21 February 2023 after a short illness. He joined London Transport as a

platform assistant in 1948, retiring at 65 from his position as shunter motorman at Neasden depot, after almost 43 years. He met Joyce, on the platform at Wembley Park in 1949, before marrying her in 1950. They lived together on Quainton Street for 57 years, in one of the original transport cottages, before moving to the Isle of Wight in 2016. Reginald is sorely missed by his proud and loving family.



James 'Jim' Butt, 74, passed away on 9 September 2022 following a 15-month battle with pancreatic cancer. Jim

joined London Transport in 1966 after leaving school. After transferring from Country Buses Reigate to London, he worked in several departments before leaving the Planning Office in 1982 to train as a teacher. Deeply missed, Jim is survived by his wife, four children and six grandchildren.



Andreas 'Andy' Ioannou, 82, passed on 22 February 2023. He served for 24 years at Holloway Bus Garage as a

conductor on routes 4, 10, 19 and 27, before taking early retirement in 1994 due to ill health. Andy had many memories of his life on the buses and his favourite; "any more fares, please?", is fondly remembered. Andy rests in peace with wife Anastasia ('Soulla') who passed away just two weeks before him.



Stuart Lapthorn, 61, passed away on 27 January 2023 in Banbury, Oxfordshire, having suffered a brain tumour.

Stuart worked as a bus driver before joining the District line as a train driver.



James 'Jim' Pennells, 76, passed away peacefully at home on 28 December 2022. He joined London

Underground as a guard in March 1977, progressing to become a driver, a position he remained in until his retirement. Jim enjoyed retirement to the full with wife Lynda and his loving family.



Arthur 'David' Read, 91, was taken away by dementia on 26 February 2022. He joined London Transport aged 18 as

a trolley bus conductor and was later promoted to the position of Road Inspector in 1957, before becoming a garage official. David retired from his position as Wood Green garage manager in 1988 after 40 years' service. David and his wife of 66 years, Margaret, enjoyed mountain climbing and hill walking in retirement. David's main pastime became gardening at his home in New Barnet.



Christopher Robey, 60, passed away suddenly and peacefully, surrounded by his family on 19 January 2023

following a stroke. He worked on the Underground and Transplant/Tube lines for 35 years before retiring five years ago. Many of his former colleagues attended his funeral as he was well loved and respected across the network. His wife, Viv, three children and three grandchildren thank everyone for their support and best wishes.



Otho Sealy, 88, passed away on 12 January 2023. Otho came from Barbados in 1964 and worked as a conductor

- then a driver - with London Transport at South Croydon bus garage until 1995. He received an award for safe driving without being responsible for a single accident on the road and spent more than 30 years on the buses. Otho is sadly missed by his wife of 57 years, Celeste, and the many who knew him.



Robert 'Bob' William Shepherd, 74, passed away on 30 October 2022. He served nearly 30 years with

London Transport (LT), starting his career in September 1963 as an apprentice body maker (under the supervision of his own father). He progressed through several positions - including instructor at the Railway Training Centre at Wood Lane - and ended his LT career as site and facilities manager at Ealing Common depot in 1993. Robert maintained his love of buses and trains – especially vintage ones – all his life. He leaves a wife, twin sister, daughter, son and granddaughter (who also loves trains) and is very much missed.



Frederick 'Fred' Thorne. 92. passed away on 19 March 2023. He joined Barking bus garage as a conductor in 1957

and went on to become a driver in 1962. After spending his entire working career at Barking bus garage, he took redundancy in 1993. He continued to drive buses for another two years, for Grey Green Coach and Buses, before retiring at 65 in 1995. He had a long, fulfilling retirement with lots of hobbies. Fred never moved away from Barking and passed away in the same house he had lived in for more than 50 years.



Philip Lindhurst, 67, passed away on 26 March 2023. Philip was a senior signal operator for London Underground.

He joined as an apprentice, aged 16, on 26 April 1971, and retired 25 May 2014. His funeral was attended by many ex-colleagues.



Fred Rutty, 92, passed away peacefully on 25 April 2023. He joined London Transport at Acton works in 1947,

meeting his wife Joan through the District line sports association. Working in the mechanical engineering department, rising through the grades to Traction engineer, Fred went on to work as a rolling stock consultant for LTI across the world. Fred enjoyed retirement from 1994, continuing his travels and involvement in local groups.

ryptocurrency is a digital asset that can be traded or exchanged online without the need of a bank. Although Bitcoin was the first to be launched in 2008, there are many others on the market. While cryptocurrency popularity has surged in recent years – with promises of high returns – it comes with even higher risks. Often unregulated, it's incredibly volatile, and may not be covered by the Financial Services Compensation Scheme.

Following the recent downfall of FTX, crypto risk has been further exposed and would-be investors should exercise extreme caution.

If something sounds too good to be true...

Fraudsters will promise high returns through cryptocurrency investing and often use social media to advertise and entice unsuspecting victims. Always ask challenging questions when considering these investments.

Protecting yourself

- Don't be rushed into making any sort of investment. No legitimate person or firm will pressure you into making an investment or committing to something on the spot
- Most firms advertising and selling investments in cryptoassets aren't authorised by the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA). This might mean no access to the Financial Ombudsman Service or the Financial Services Compensation Scheme if things go wrong
- Check the FCA Register pregister.fca.org.uk to make sure you're dealing with an authorised firm and check the FCA Warning List of firms to avoid fca.org.uk/scamsmart/warning-list

YOUR PCC NEEDS YOU!

ominations sought for TfL
Pension Fund members to
stand for election on the TfL
Pension Consultative Council (PCC).
The PCC is made up of three sections
representing Fund members:

Section I Pensioners and deferred pensioners (8 seats)

Section 2 Employees of TfL, subsidiaries and contractors except those covered by section 3 (4 seats)

Section 3 Employees of London Underground, its subsidiaries and contractors (8 seats)

The PCC meets at least four times a year to discuss the administration of the Pension Fund, picking up issues of concern to Fund members (other than those relating to individual entitlements to benefits under the Fund), commenting on and making formal representations. Four Councillors (two from section I and one each from sections 2 & 3) are nominated by the PCC as Trustees of

the Fund and regularly report at PCC meetings.

The eight PCC members from section I are required to also attend the four Pensioners' Forum meetings each year to meet with TfL management representatives to discuss/be consulted on issues relevant to pensioners and deferred pensioners, such as retired staff travel entitlements.

PCC councillors are elected for four years, so five complete their terms of office each year, although they are usually eligible for re-election. Five seats are therefore to be elected to take office on I December 2023.

The councillors whose term of office will end are Joel Kosminsky and Chris Sullivan from section I, Maria Taylor from section 2 with Paul Murphy and Paul O'Brien from section 3. All are eligible for re-election if they wish.

Nominations must be made in writing by a member of the TfL Pension Fund from the same section as the nominee and countersigned by another member of the same

section. The information listed below must accompany the nomination:

- Name, as nominee wishes it to appear on the ballot paper
- Dates, if nominee has previously held office as a councillor
- Whether pensioner or deferred pensioner if they are from section I
- A personal statement of up to II0 words, including the reason for standing for election or re-election to the PCC

A passport sized photograph may also be provided for inclusion with the voting papers. The information provided must be factual, appropriate and inoffensive.

Completed nominations must be sent by Friday I8 August 2023 to the PCC Secretary Tim Handley, TfL Pension Fund, 4th Floor, 200 Buckingham Palace Road, London, SWIW 9TJ. For more details, head to tfl.gov.uk/pensions or contact the PCC Secretary.

If there are more nominations than vacancies, elections will be held by postal ballot among Fund members in the relevant sections.



FLYING HIGH





joined London Transport (LT) at 16 in 1960 as a Civil Engineering trainee. After training, I started at the Permanent Way Design Office, becoming one of four section leaders. While there, I worked on track installation in the (then) new Victoria line tunnels. I eventually transferred to the Principal Project Manager's Office, managing the escalator – and later lift – replacement programmes.

I learned to fly at Biggin Hill and joined the Central Road Services Sports Association Flying Club at Fairoaks in Surrey. After qualifying as an instructor, I spent many happy weekends teaching other LT staff to fly. In 1979/80 I studied for – and obtained – a Commercial Pilot's Licence.

In 1988, after 28 years with LT, I left to become a professional pilot at Gama Aviation. I spent 10 very happy years flying celebrities, businessmen, and human organ transplant teams, as well as operating medivac flights throughout Europe, Scandinavia and North Africa. It was on a medivac flight from Salzburg to Plymouth that I met my third wife Jenny.

Sadly, Jenny became ill, so in 1998 I reluctantly left Gama

Aviation to move to Exeter, where I joined Jersey European Airlines (later to become Flybe). I retired from flying in 2009. I consider myself fortunate that my career spanned from hundreds of feet below ground to thousands of feet above it!

ooking tickets and reserving seats
Staff Travel Card (Box Ticket) and Status Pass holders will now have received information in an email from RDG on how to register for RSTL online, the portal where you'll be able to book tickets online and reserve seats.

PTAC holders **cannot** currently register for this service, but can continue to book tickets at the booking office or with the Train Operator itself.

TfL Staff Travel are in discussions with Rail Staff Travel to roll this out to all PTAC holders in the next 12 months.

developments. Government responded to TfL's October 2022 options submission in February 2023.

TfL wrote to Government on I7 March 2023 stating that – in their view – several outstanding questions needed to be addressed before they could finalise any proposals for change, and that 'do nothing' remained an option. At this stage, there are no proposals for change and any changes that may emerge would not
