Nominations for TfL Pension Consultative Council in 2010

Nominations are being sought for TfL Pension Fund members to stand for election to the TfL Pension Consultative Council (PCC).

Five representatives need to be selected to replace those due to retire from office on 30 November 2010 under the PCC's constitution.

Representatives due to retire are David Biggs and John Howie from Section One (representing pensioners and deferred pensioners), Stephen Ellaby from Section Two (representing employees of TfL, its subsidiaries or contractors) and Jackie Darby and Thandi Davis from Section Three (representing employees of London Underground, its subsidiaries or contractors).

Successful nominees in Section One should also note that attendance at Pensioner Forum meetings is a requirement of election.

Any TfL Pension Fund member may nominate another member as a candidate for election or re-election to the section that represents them both. Retiring representatives can also be nominated.

Nominations must be made in writing by a member of the same section as the nominee. Each nomination must be countersigned by another Fund member represented by the same section. The information listed below and a personal statement of up to 100 words, including the reason for standing for election, or re-election, to the PCC, must accompany the nomination:

- name, as nominee wishes it to appear on the ballot paper
- dates, if nominee has previously held office as a Councillor
- whether pensioner or deferred
- pensioner if from Section One.

A passport-sized photograph may also be provided for inclusion in voting papers.

Please note that the information provided must be factual, appropriate and inoffensive.

Completed nominations must be sent to PCC Secretary Sarah Pascall, TfL Pensions Directorate, 4th Floor, Wing Over Station, London, SW1H 0BD by Friday 13 August 2010. Copies of the PCC constitution are also available from the same address.

If there are more nominations than vacancies, elections will be held by postal ballot among Fund members in the relevant sections.

Pioneering bus design unveiled

Mayor of London Boris Johnson has unveiled the chosen design for the New Bus for London, based on the iconic Routemaster.

The design includes an open platform echoing that of the Routemaster. It will have three doors, including the open platform, and two staircases to speed up boarding.

The bus will be made of lightweight materials and has lots of glass to show off the design features and give the bus a light, airy feel.

It will also use the latest green technology, making it 15 per cent more fuel-efficient than

current hybrid buses and 40 per cent more efficient than conventional diesel buses.

The new buses are due to enter service from early 2012.

TfL to acquire Tube Lines shares

Transport for London is to acquire all the shares in Tube Lines, allowing more flexibility in the delivery of upgrades on the Jubilee, Northern and Piccadilly lines. Tube Lines shareholders Bechtel and Amey (Ferrovial) have agreed the sale of their equity for £310 million.

The agreement, due to complete as *otm* went to press on 30 June, will

free TfL from the Public Private Partnership (PPP) structure, and will involve no extra financial call on the government, passengers or taxpayers for the delivery of the upgrades.

Pensioners' Forum findings

Head of Pension Fund Stephen Field said the Guide for Pensioners would be available from 13 May. A copy would be sent to all PLRs and posted on the website. 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With just two years until the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games, the momentum is building.

The busiest parts of the network have been identified and the train service timetable is being put together as we speak.

Dominic Haddock, Senior Planner – Olympic Engagement, said: "Everyone with an event ticket will also get a free one-day Travelcard for public transport. The Olympic Delivery Authority's aim is for 100 per cent of spectators and the 2012 Games workforce to use public transport to get to and from the events, so we're expecting 12 million extra passengers on the transport network.

"The Jubilee, District and Central lines will bear the brunt of the spectator crowds. As some events are scheduled to finish at around midnight, services will need to run later, but at the moment we don't have any plans for services to run throughout the night."

In the coming months, all

TfL modes and National Rail train operating companies will work together on travel demand management.

Dominic said: "This will involve pinpointing the best travel advice to give to spectators on how to get to each event – and it may not be the most obvious route, as planners will aim to minimise congestion."

Travel demand management also includes working with businesses to encourage them to adopt home working or alternative routes for staff to get to and from work, to reduce the number of commuters using public transport during the Games.

Events take place at more than 20 venues across London, and there will also be live sites with giant screens, cultural events, concerts and food festivals. Three of these sites – Hyde Park, Jubilee Gardens near London Bridge and Potters Fields – have already been confirmed.



New Victoria line trains are now being introduced into service at the rate of one every two weeks, so it won't be long before the full fleet of 47 is in operation.

The trains are faster, with more space, more seats, higher

ceilings, better ventilation and lighting, wider aisles and doors and dedicated space for wheelchairs.

The upgrade of the line means 33 trains per hour will be able to run, instead of the previous 27.

Full of Eastern promise

A full service is now running on London Overground's £1 billion East London line route between Dalston Junction and West Croydon. It marks the biggest piece of transport infrastructure for London

since the Jubilee line extension.

Twelve trains per hour run between Dalston Junction and New Cross Gate. Passengers benefit from new walk-through airconditioned trains, four newly built stations and 14 refurbished stations with better CCTV,

information systems and lighting.

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
Family ties

Digging deep: workers have completed

Lift-off for accessibility

Hainault station now has stepfree access, making it easier for mobility impaired passengers.

Two lifts have been installed on the outside of the building, creating an attractive architectural feature into the bargain.

Project Manager Stephen Boyne

said: "It's an impressive structure that gives the station a good mix of old and new."

And at Green Park, step-free access for a central London station is getting closer, with the excavation of the 26-metre lift shaft completed in April. The new passenger lifts will enter service in late 2011. One will take customers from the street to the ticket hall, while two will run from the ticket hall to the Victoria line and the Piccadilly/Jubilee line interchange passageway, connecting to the existing facilities

for step-free access.

Group Station Manager Chris Oduola said: "Improving step-free access to our station will bring major benefits to our staff and customers."

A trip back in time



The heritage train *Sarah Siddons* brought joy to three groups of daytrippers in May.

Residents of the Shepherd Day Centre in Rickmansworth and the Heritage House School in Chesham enjoyed a special trip in this stunning train on the Metropolitan line.

The train ran again during the Rickmansworth Canal Festival for the London Transport Museum on 16 May.

The journeys started at Rickmansworth, travelling northbound and back, with the chance for passengers to alight at Amersham and Harrow-onthe-Hill to view locomotives.

Rickmansworth Train Operations Manager Paul Jessett said: "Both days were a massive success. It was great to bring such fun events to the line."

Just the TIC-ket

Travel Information Centres (TICs) celebrate their 70th anniversary this year, and the milestone was marked with the opening of a new centre at King's Cross St Pancras.

TICs have served tens of millions of passengers since the first one – a mobile office – was opened in 1940 to help Londoners get around during the Blitz.

There are now six TICs across the network – at Victoria, Heathrow, Euston, Liverpool Street, Piccadilly Circus and the new one at King's Cross St Pancras. They offer information and advice about transport services in London, including fares, tickets and maps, and many of their staff have language skills to help visitors from overseas.

FIVE DECADES OF SERVICE

The Metropolitan line A stock celebrates 50 years of running this year.

Originally designed in the 1930s, production was halted due to a lack of funds during World War Two, but the trains were then commissioned for the extension of the electrification from Rickmansworth to Amersham. In its heyday, the A stock was the world's fastest four-rail train with a maximum speed of 70mph, and operated at this speed until around a decade ago, when the speed limit was reduced to 50mph to improve reliability.

The original trains were refurbished by Bombardier between 1993 and 1998, and will be completely replaced by the new S stock by the end of 2011.

the Piccadilly line based at Oakwood for nine years. He took retirement on medical grounds in 1986.

GORDON GRUBB 11 April 2010, aged 77

His working life was spent in the Chief Signal Engineer's office.

GRAHAM HADINGHAM April 2010, aged 101

Graham was a member of the Finance Department of LT and was the oldest member of the Fifty Five Society before his death.

REG HIGGINS

8 May 2010, aged 80 Reg joined Fulwell trolleybus depot in the early 1940s and later became an apprentice electrician. Reg later joined Chiswick Works as a timekeeper, checking staff clocking in and out cards, where he stayed for around 25 years.

GRAHAM PAGE

11 April 2010, aged 73 Graham's career included rail rolling stock engineering, training and bus operation. He was a keen bus enthusiast, a well-known and active volunteer at the LT Museum, and an expert in bus ticket memorabilia.

AUSTIN (OSSIE) ROBINSON

29 December 2008, aged 76 Austin joined LU in 1970 at Earl's Court and later became an assistant technician at Wood Lane. He retired in 1998 after 28 years' service.

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Fitting last journey for driver

A Routemaster served as a hearse for the funeral of a former London bus driver.

Michael Tomlin passed away in March. Relative Stephen Morris, who owns the Routemaster and runs Routemaster Buses in Shropshire, said: "We thought it was a really appropriate send-off for him. He drove one of these buses in central London for 20 years or so."

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FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

A selection of frequently asked questions and the answers.

STAFF TRAVEL

Q: Is there is any discount on an Oyster card for someone who is 85? They have a Surrey bus pass.

A: If someone is a retired ex-TfL employee, they may have been eligible to retain an Oyster card or a PTAC that would allow them privileges in retirement. However, there are savings on magnetic fares, and an off-peak rate would give some savings. Also, if travelling within the zones, the card will cap after a number of journeys and, if they touch in and out, no further fares are charged for the day.

Q: Where is the Staff Travel webpage?

A: The Staff Travel webpage can be found by clicking on the Your Pension link on the TfL Pension Fund website, and then the link called Staff Travel in the bottom left corner.

Q: I am a retired ex-TfL employee aged 93 and live in Spain. I have never received a birthday hamper. Why not?

A: Unfortunately, only TfL pensioners who live in the UK receive a birthday hamper.

Q: I have received a letter from a rep saying he wants to visit me. Why?

A: The offer to visit you is purely social – the Pensioner Liaison Reps are there to help if you have any general questions, and they are also retired ex-TfL employees.

Ticket tribulations

My husband is a retired LU employee and I have a privilege card for the trains. On a trip to London, various ticket offices said I had to have an Oyster card for the Underground. I did get a return privilege ticket at Charing Cross, but it only worked in the machines on the out journey. The next day, I asked at Turnham Green for a single and was told they are no longer issued, but eventually one was found.

From this experience, I would say it is essential for spouses of retired staff in the same situation to have an Oyster card. I saw in he last issue that we can obtain a form from the Staff Travel web page, but I was unable to find it.

I used my privilege ticket on both occasions, purchasing the ticket at Tottenham Hale to go to Stansted and at Stansted National Rail ticket office to return to Tottenham Hale. I was charged two different prices (a lower one on the return journey).

Was this a mistake, or is it something to do with the ownership of the respective ticket offices? If so, why is this?

We charge the National Rail fare set by ATOC, so there should be no difference unless you travelled at peak/off-peak times.
