POSTHUMOUS AWARD



Graham Page – who did so much to further the cause of the London Transport Museum Friends – has been awarded a posthumous award for his work.

Graham (pictured left), who died suddenly in May 2010, aged 73, won the Long Service Award in the London Volunteers In Museum Awards 2011.

Graham worked as a curatorial volunteer at the London Transport Museum and possessed a superb knowledge of ticketing issues.

He was held in such high regard that the organisers of the awards agreed to accept a posthumous nomination for him. Graham began his career as an apprentice at Acton
Underground Works, winning the 'Apprentice of the Year' award in 1958. He later became Training and Development Manager for London Buses before taking early retirement in 1993.

Barry Le Jeune, Chairman of the London Transport Museum Friends, said: "Graham's contribution was exceptional. He had an unrivalled knowledge, particularly of transport tickets. He also played a major part in identifying and acquiring numerous additional items for the museum's collection. He was an exceptional man and a real gentleman."

PENSIONERS' FORUM SUMMARY

A summary of the latest meeting on 29 July 2011

- The Pensioners' Representatives were given an update on 'Project Horizon' organisational changes within TfL which will impact on areas affecting pensioners. It was noted that the TfL Pension Fund itself will not be directly affected.
- The Pensions Manager advised that details of the Pensions Bill had not yet been finalised and it was not likely to receive Royal Assent until later in the year. Once full details were known, consideration would be given to addressing any implications for TfL pensioners.
- The Pensioner Liaison Manager reported on the Annual Meeting of Pensioner Liaison Representatives held in July. It was also noted that a Regional Meeting of PLRs was arranged for the West Sussex area on 1 September, following which consideration would be given to holding such meetings in other areas.
- The Staff Travel Business
 Support Manager reported that
 arrangements were in hand for
 the renewal of Privilege Ticket
 Authority Cards at the end of
 2011. You will be receiving your
 new PTACs throughout December.

PERMIT TO TRAVEL

Members sometimes experience difficulty – such as not being able to purchase a discounted ticket with their PTAC – especially when trying to travel and enter National Rail stations when ticket offices are closed. A few stations still have "Permit to Travel" machines which must be used before boarding the train. However, if this is not possible and you are using a station with barriers, you should explain the situation to a member of the

gateline staff. If they are unable to sell you a privilege rate ticket, you should be allowed through the barrier to purchase a ticket on the train or at your destination station. If there are no gateline staff, then the barriers will be open. If you encounter further problems, please put it in writing with details of the journey you wished to make with the station, dates and times and send to Staff Travel.

STRATFORD FACELIFT

Upgrade work has begun at Stratford bus station – one of London's busiest.

London E15 is big news at the moment. The clock is counting down to next year's Olympic and Paralympic Games and Westfield – the biggest urban shopping development in Europe – opened recently.


The numbers using the bus station have climbed from 3.5 million in 1994

to a present day figure of 20 million.

The project to rebuild the station is costing TfL \pounds 1.7 million and includes new shelters, new toilets and a mess room for drivers.

The new layout will increase the amount of space available for waiting passengers and ensure there is a better flow of people so they can get on and off their buses more easily.

LIGHT SHED ON MYSTERY CERTIFICATE

Following an article in the last issue, a number of readers have written in to provide some information about Sidney Bowran. And he sounds like quite a character, possibly a bow tie-wearing rugby player!

US Air Force lieutenant colonel Scott Willits found a London Transport long-service award dated September 1972 belonging to Sidney in the back of a portrait.

Reader Nicholas Ridge wrote: "I recall Sid as a foreman in the Wheel Area at Acton Works. He was a great character," and Alan Cloake wrote: "During my time at Acton Works, there was a Sid Bowran working as a shop foreman in the Truck Shop."

Meanwhile a Mr B Webb from Twyford, Berkshire, who served his apprenticeship at Acton Works between 1952 and 1957 recalls: "Sid was a foreman in the wheel area and he was quite a character. It crossed my mind that the portrait purchased by Scott could be of Sid himself. Sid was of large build, possibly a rugby player, dark hair and sometimes wore a bow tie."

Scott is keen to return the certificate to its rightful home so we will be passing these details on to him.

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
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JOE THE TR

To coincide with Black History Month, otm recalls Joe Clough, London's first black motorbus driver.

Joe was born in Kingston, Jamaica, in 1887 and arrived in England in 1906.

His public transport career started in 1908 when he was employed as a bus driver by the London General Omnibus Company (LGOC). Unknown to Joe he was making history as London's first black motorbus driver.

Joe drove a B-type motorbus between Liverpool Street and Wormwood Scrubs.

In 1911, Joe married Millicent, a white domestic servant known as Margaret and, before the outbreak of war, the couple moved to St Neots where Joe worked for the local bus firm.

He served in the British Army during the war before he and Margaret moved to

Bedford and Joe worked as a bus driver for Eastern National Buses for the next 27 years, before becoming a much-loved and highlyrespected taxi driver, known throughout the town.

Joe's beloved Margaret died in 1975 and Joe died a year later at the age of 90.

To this day he is remembered in Bedford with huge respect and affection.

John worked at Wealdstone for many years and then Commerce Road, Brentford, serving the business for 26 years.

FRED FORSTER 6 June 2011, aged 88

Fred worked as a booking office clerk at Holloway Road and then Cockfosters before his retirement.

TONY (BOB) GEARY 6 April 2011, aged 82

'Bob' started as a 'box boy' at the age of 14 and finished his career as a traffic controller in Harrow Signal Box. His father and grandfather, also both called Bob, also worked for the business.

HARRY MEAD 14 April 2011, aged 82

Harry worked at Fulwell bus garage as a bus driver for almost 40 years. He was an active trade unionist and worked as a chief negotiator for the TUC. He was also a Trustee of the London Transport Pension Fund and, in 1978, received the British Empire Medal for services to the TUC.

20 August 2011, aged 78

Peter spent most of his career in railway rolling stock engineering and retired as Divisional Engineer (District and Piccadilly).

RICHARD (DICK) TEDDER 18 October 2010, aged 87

Dick was previously a 'progress chaser' at Chiswick Works. He joined London Transport after serving in the RAF during the war and retired in September 1987.

John began his career in the Chief Mechanical Engineer's (Railways) department. He later moved to Buses as Training Manager before retiring as Managing Director Buses (South London).

A: There will be a map going onto the back of the "Conditions of Use" when they are reprinted in the New Year.

Q: I would like to update my photograph and change my home address details before the Privilege Ticket Authority Cards (PTACs) are reissued for the end of the year?

A: Unfortunately, for the general re-issue, this is now not available as the main report has already been sent. However, this can still be done by submitting your request in writing to Staff Travel as per normal.

BARKING BOX

Sidney Gates, has asked through the London Transport Retired Staff Association, what is happening to Barking Signal Box. Sidney used to work as a signalman for London, Midland and Scottish (LMS) Railway before being transferred to London Transport in 1960 when LT took responsibility for signalling in the Barking area. Sidney said: "I have heard that the box is being closed but would be interested to know for definite what is happening to it."

Richard Gray, Service Control Manager District line, thanked Sidney for his interest and said: "London Underground's Asset Performance Directorate (APD) have taken possession of the disused old British Rail signal cabin in order to accommodate maintenance staff. It is being refurbished with a new roof going on. There is no change to the London Underground signal cabin which is next door in the same building."
