The overall advice for people travelling during the Games is:

- Plan in advance and find out if your journey will be affected
- Consider alternatives another

type of transport might be better

- If you aren't going to a Games event, try to avoid venue stations
- If you have to travel avoid the busiest times

Avoid driving in affected areas.

Additionally, the aim is to make London 2012 the most accessible Games ever with the DLR, buses, taxis and piers all already fully wheelchair accessible.

There are new lifts at Green Park and Southfields and 65 step-free Tube stations. If you're travelling to a Games venue, please use the Spectator Journey Planner at London2012. com to plan your journey. If you're travelling elsewhere in London, then the TfL Journey Planner can help plan accessible journeys.

PENSIONERS' FORUM SUMMARY

Issues discussed at the meeting on 23 February 2012 included the following:

- TfL Pension Fund 2012 Actuarial Valuation The timetable for the 2012 Actuarial Valuation was discussed. The Head of Pensions said that a presentation of the results to the Forum was scheduled for early 2013 and agreed that sufficient time would be allowed for the Pensioners' Representatives to consider and give their views on any consequent actions proposed.
- Pensioner Liaison Scheme The Pensioner Liaison Manager reported that, following the success of the first regional meeting of Pensioner Liaison Representatives, authorisation had

- been give for up to six further such meetings being arranged over the next year to determine their effectiveness. The Pensioners' Representatives welcomed this development.
- Staff Travel It was reported that the reissue of Privilege Ticket Authority Cards project carried out at the end of 2011 had been achieved on time without any major problems. The Pensioners' Representatives said they were pleased to report that they were not aware of any significant issues having arisen connected with this major exercise.

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TROLLEY GOOD SHOW

Just after 01:00 on Wednesday 9 May 1962, London's very last trolleybus service ran into Fulwell depot in Twickenham.

Now, to mark the 50th anniversary of its passing, a series of events have been planned.

On Saturday 12 May, a free open day will be held at Fulwell depot. London's first and last trolleybuses will be on display along with other classic London buses, including Routemasters. Visit www.trolleybus50.co.uk or phone 020 8979 8127.

The anniversary will also be marked at the East Anglia Transport Museum at Carlton Colville on Sunday 6 and Monday 7 May with nearly all of London's preserved trolleybuses in attendance. For further details visit www.eatm.org.uk or phone 01502 518459.

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

PENSION ELEMENTS	
FUND PENSION	This is the pension you earned as a Fund member, over and above any Guaranteed Minimum Pension (GMP) you may have. This element is subject to Pension increases in accordance with the Fund Rules. The increase is based on the change in the Retail Prices Index (RPI) for the 12 months ending on 30 September in the previous year. If you joined the Fund after 1 April 1989 your increase will be restricted to 5 per cent.
FUND VARIABLE PENSION	This is a temporary pension which stops when you reach State Pension Age. If the Government change State Pension Age this part of the pension will stop when originally advised at retirement. This element is subject to Pension increases in accordance with the Fund Rules. The increase is based on the change in the RPI for the 12 months ending on 30 September in the previous year. If you joined the Fund after 1 April 1989 your increase will be restricted to 5 per cent.
GMP (PRE 88)	The Fund pays GMPs in return for being contracted out of the earnings related part of the State Pension Scheme. Pre 88 GMP is the GMP earned up to 5 April 1988. This element is increased by the State; increases are paid with your State pension.
GMP (POST 88)	This is the GMP earned between 6 April 1988 and 5 April 1997, this element is increased by the Fund in line with increases in the Consumer Prices Index (CPI) up to 3 per cent a year. If the increase in CPI is greater than 3 per cent, the extra increase will be paid by the State with your State Pension.
OTHER PAYMENTS	This will include any pension paid for by your former employer rather than the Fund.

Note: If your pension has been in payment for less than 12 months, you may receive a proportionate increase, details are included on the reverse of your annual payslip.

Fondly remembered

PETER CARTER 2 October 2011, aged 55

Affectionately known as 'Blakey,' Peter joined the business in October 1977. In 1990, he became an engineering supervisor at Walthamstow. In 1992, Peter moved to LU as a production manager based at Northumberland Park. He took voluntary redundancy in 2005. Peter had been fighting cancer for two years before his death.

PHIL GEEN

Date of death unknown, aged 78

Phil died in 2011 although the exact date is unknown. He joined London Transport in December 1956 and ended his career as an engineering train operator at Lillie Bridge. He retired in 1993. Phil was the ASLEF branch chairman at Lillie Bridge.

STAN HARDING 27 September 2011, aged 92

Stan worked for London Transport for 37 years before retiring in 1981. His early career

was spent as a booking office clerk on the Northern line and later he became group manager based at Kennington. He received two Royal Humane Society Awards.

FREDERICK 'FRED' HILL 29 December 2011, aged 88

Fred joined the business in 1937 and spent his entire working life based at Aldenham Bus Overhaul Works, Elstree, where he worked as a maintenance engineer.

KENNETH HOYLE 19 March 2012, aged 85

Ken retired in November 1986 after nearly 33 years with London Transport. He started as a bus driver in South London and later became an Inspector. He was an Area Traffic Inspector when he retired.

KEN JOHNSON 25 October 2011, aged 68

Ken joined London Transport in 1967 as a bus driver based at Wandsworth garage. He later moved to Hammersmith, and finally Putney. Well-known for his smart attire and safe driving, Ken took medical retirement in the mid 1990s.

BRIAN LETTINGTON

18 June 2011, aged 74

Brian worked as a bus driver, based at New Cross. He started in 1974 and worked for London Transport for nearly 27 years before taking early retirement due to ill health in 2000. Brian suffered two major strokes before moving to Cornwall, with his wife Julie in March 2002. He died very suddenly last June.

KEN LIDDLE 22 March 2012, aged 91

Ken spent most of his career working in Finance but retired as Chief Establishment Officer. He was Chairman of the theatrical London Transport Players.

GOBIN 'EDDIE' WALVIN 16 February 2012, aged 78

Gobin joined London Transport in 1972 and worked as an electrician based at Earl's Court depot. He took early retirement in 1993.

We were delighted to receive this wonderful letter from **otm** reader Barbara Thompson.

Sixty years ago next month I joined London Transport as a trolley bus conductor at Stonebridge depot. In 1957, I met and married my driver, George Reynolds, who became a revenue inspector until his retirement in 1980. We had a good marriage. In the meantime I moved to Mortlake Garage and I loved the job, great company and friends. I retired two years early, in 1985, to care for George who sadly died in 1993.

I had been a widow for almost five years when an old friend came into my life again. He was a retired garage manager called Patrick Thompson who many will remember. We married in 2001 at the ages of 74 and 77. My dear Patrick died five years ago on 10 January 2007. So I upped sticks and came back to the town I was born in 84 years ago. I remember I used to walk to the garage early in the morning thinking there must be a better way of earning a living but, do you know, I don't think there was. 33 years, seven months and I loved every minute of it. If there are any old mates out there I would love to hear from them.

MY DAD THE POLICEMAN
